

March 11 - MAD FOR MODERN - DETROIT DESIGN AT MID CENTURY - Format TBD Deborah Lubera Kawsky, Ph.D., Art Historian, Professor of Art History - Madonna University

The current resurgence of interest in Detroit has inspired a rediscovery of Detroit's (and Michigan's) role in the modern

movement. Indeed, at mid century, Metro Detroit was home to innovative architects and designers — like Charles and Ray Eames, Eero Saarinen, Minoru Yamasaki, Alexander Girard and Ruth Adler



Schnee — and to forward-thinking institutions like Cranbrook Art Academy and the Herman Miller furniture company — each dedicated to using modern design to enhance life in the postwar era. Join us to explore examples of mid-century modern design in Michigan, from a recently restored Alexander Girard home to a ground-breaking modern design exhibition held in 1949 at the DIA!

March 18 - THE PURPLE GANG at Next Only Paul R. Kavieff, Author and Crime Historian

The Detroit Purple Gang was one of the most ruthless organized crime groups in U.S. history. The gang had its roots in Detroit's

lower eastside during WWI. During the 20s, they rose to become the dominant force in the Detroit underworld through murder, intimidation and official protection. Detroit Police estimated that



over 500 unsolved murders in Detroit could be attributed to the Gang. With strong connections to other U.S. organized crime groups, they controlled gambling, drugs, extortion and illegal liquor and beer manufacturing in Southeast Michigan for approximately five years from 1927 to 1932. Lengthy prison sentences and internal sniping caused the Purple Gang to essentially self-destruct by 1935.

March 25 - MICHIGAN'S ABANDONED WELLS via Zoom

Adam W. Wygant, Director and State Geologist-Oil, Gas and Minerals Division - Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy

Long-gone prospectors in the 1800s drilled wells for oil and gas

in Michigan, looking to cash in and fuel the American Industrial Revolution. When wells dried up and drillers went bust, wells were left uncapped, their decaying pipes plunging deep and left behind



in forests, fields or farms that were later developed into towns and cities. Some operators left the pipes open — while others plugged them with mud, scrap lumber or leftover construction material. These are called orphaned wells. If not properly remediated, they can leak greenhouse gasses into the atmosphere and contribute to global warming. This presentation will give an overall history of oil and gas production in our state and the Orphan Well Program's accomplishments, which includes the plugging of nearly 400 orphan wells over the past few decades.






